OSTARA

Ostara marks the Spring Equinox, which happens between March 19 -23. Ostara is a pagan celebration of the German goddess Eostre and the origins of the Christian celebration of Easter. As the beginning of spring, Ostara is a good time to literally and figuratively plant seeds for the future.

is a Jewish holiday occurring on 5th- 6th February and is celebrated as "New Year for the trees," in Jewish tradition.

A few of the ways it is typically celebrated are physically planting trees in Israel, making contributions to the Jewish National Fund, which uses the donations to plant trees in Israel, eating fruits and grains that remind us of the Land of Israel, especially what are known as the "seven species": wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives and dates. HOLI

Holi has been celebrated in the Indian subcontinent for centuries. It marks the beginning of spring after a long winter, symbolic of the triumph of good over evil. This year, it will be celebrated on March 8th.

On the eve of the festival, large pyres are lit in many parts of India to signify the burning of evil spirits. People often throw wood, dried leaves and twigs into bonfires. On the day of Holi, entire streets and towns turn red, green and yellow as people throw colored powder into the air and splash them on others. Each color carries a meaning. REMEMBER YOUR WHY!

Do you remember your admissions letter or cover letter to our Population Health Department? The one that shared in detail where you come from, where you are now, and where you're going. The one full of enthusiasm and purpose. Your "why" was so clear.

Right now, you might be knee deep in a grant application, anxious about classes, or having imposter syndrome about being at Big Duke. You might be far, far from your "why". That's how I feel often. In these times, reminding myself about my "why" has helped me regroup and reorient myself and my work.



So what is my why --- Now, I am reminded of my "why" through my part-time job with the Population Health Division at Durham County Department of Public Health. As a former community health worker, I feel at home working with this group, promoting health initiatives at the local level. This work has connected with my studies and research at Duke, too. I've had the opportunity to contribute to the county's Community Health Assessment and the Comunidad Latina survey. I plan on apply what I learned in analytic methods courses to help analyze the 2022 Community Health Assessment survey results, which will determine the county's top 5 health priorities for the next 3 years.

Housed at DCo's Population Health Division is Partnership for a <u>Healthy Durham</u>, a county-wide partnership of community members, service providers, elected officials, university researchers, and others who come together to rally behind prioritized health issues identified in the community health assessment. As a member of the Partnership, I've been able to see how these health priorities are addressed across organizations in Durham. Serving as a committee member in the Partnership is phenomenal way to get show up at the table with other population health leaders in our community. In my role, I also lead Durham County's NCCARE360 Taskforce, which provides local, community-based governance for the first year of utilization of NCCare360 in Durham County.

My work with the Population Health Division at Durham County Department of Public Health helps me have perspective on my graduate studies, and helps me remember my "why". I hope you all can ground your work in your "why".




